1. Is government health spending consistent with country wealth?

Planned government spending on health in 2014, as proportion of GDP. Target reached > 5%; Close to target > 3%; Far from target < 3%; Progress = 2014 > 2013.

2. Is health spending prioritised in the government budget?

Planned government spending on health in 2014, as proportion of total government budget. Target reached > 15%; Close to target > 10%; Far from target < 10%; Progress = 2014 > 2013.

3. Does the government spend enough on each person's health?

Planned government spending on health in 2014, per person. Target reached > \$86; Close to target > \$40; Far from target < \$40; Progress = 2014 > 2013.

4. Is government health spending transparent?

Type of budget classification, 2013.

Gold star = programme and beneficiary classification;

Green = programme classification;

Yellow = sub-sector classification;

Amber = sub-ministry or sector classification;

Red = ministry classification.

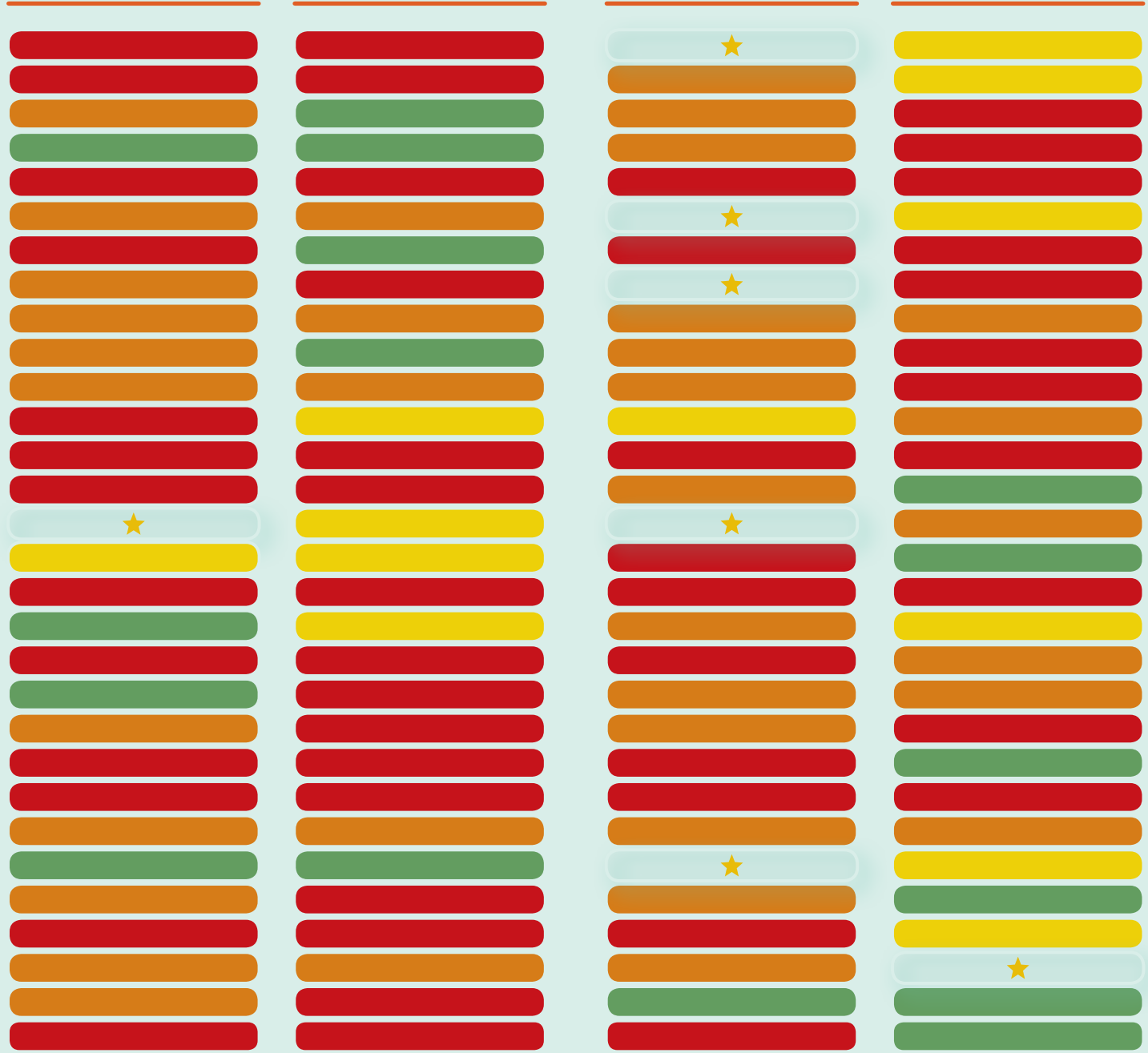
